MINISTER'S COLUMN

Rev. M. Gritters Bellflower Protestant Reformed Church

"Wagons for Your Little Ones" (Gen. 45:19)

God was keeping His promise to Abraham. He was saving His people. They were in Canaan, but to be kept alive they had to go to Egypt to come under the protecting care which God had recently set up under Joseph.

In saving His people God pressed Pharoah into His service. (What a great God we have!) Pharoah said to Joseph: "Go to Canaan, get your father and bring him here.

But it is a big trip to make. Pharoah was opening the way for Joseph to get his father and family and bring them here to Egypt. In that family were the wives. To that family belonged also the old man Jacob. They could not walk that great distance.

And to that family belonged also the little ones. How will they travel that great distance?

Pharoah said: "I will give you horses and wagons for your wives, for old Jacob and for your little ones." How wonderful! Then the entire family would be provided for. The whole family would be caught up into the gracious process of salvation.

Pharoah likely had political reasons for sending these wagons to Canaan and fetching the little ones. But the important thing to see is that God, Who always cares for His people, cares especially for the little ones. And God presses His claims even upon Pharoah, in behalf of His frail people.

God's little ones have to get along.

Then there must be wagons. God concerned Himself about them. They could never walk these many miles from Canaan to Egypt. No doubt Joseph reminded Pharoah about it and God directed his heart.

So the wagons came to Canaan. And they loaded the little ones on the wagons and off they went... they, too, got along. How could they leave them behind?

God has put the concern for our little ones into our hearts. By the grace of the Covenant God we are covenant-minded. We Christian people think of the old folks (at our Christian Home), we also think of the little ones. Our little ones must get along. God's covenant is to "thee AND thy seed". There must be wagons.

God has sent out wagons. Among them are our Christian schools, lower and higher. It costs money

to pull these wagons, but the God Who can work even in Pharoah's heart works in ours, and we share the cost. Scores of teachers, board members, janitors, helpers of every sort, all helping the parents to pull the wagons.

But some of our children cannot ride on these standard wagons.

They are the handicapped ones.

Shall we let them behind? We do not have facilities for these handicapped in our regular Christian schools. But God will have all our little ones get along in the process of Christian instruction.

So God has put it into our hearts to have a Special School for our handicapped. And so there is a Salem Christian School for our frail ones who need special attention and special equipment.

We are grateful that the Lord has made this possible. Through the diligence of the Mothers' Club the School has been able recently to purchase a vehicle to transport these children.

Our two teachers diligently carry on not only the daily work at Salem Christian School, but also on the playground and on the highways fetching and returning the children.

Wagons for our little ones. Special wagons for the frail ones.

Isn't God merciful? And we will be thankful, and work and pray.

The next evening, on September 2, the Board of Directors met to organize, elect officers, and appoint committees. Miss De Hoog was retained as a teacher, and Mrs. J. Goematt was hired as a part time assistant.

Classes for eight children are being held in two of the unoccupied classrooms of Bellflower Christian School. One room is used as a classroom, and the other room is used as a playroom.

We invite you one and all to visit Salem. Come when you can. The teachers and the children will welcome you. Or if you prefer, contact the Board of Directors and they will make arrangements to have a speaker sent to your society to acquaint vou with Salem.

A Letter from the family of Carl Molendyk -

"Upon the advice of several competent individuals who are well acquainted with Children's Retreat in Michigan, and after much prayer, we the family of little Carl Molendyk were led to the decision that Carl, $6\frac{1}{2}$ years of age, should be admitted to this institution. After consulting with our pastor, Rev. Van Peursem, Carl's teachers at Salem, Miss Christine De Hoog, and the president of the board of of Pine Rest, Rev. J. Holwerda, arrangements were made to have Carl admitted to Children's Retreat.

We received word very soon that Carl was adjusting very well, and that he was happy and content. Two weeks later we were notified that Carl was very ill with virus pneumonia and that he was taken to Blodgett Hospital in Grand Rapids, where he was believed to be at the brink of death.

Besides being handicapped because of cerebral palsy, Carl is also afflicted with a blood disease which lowers his resistance and consequently cannot combat infection. Periodic blood transfusions and the miracle of modern medical research which produced the wonder drugs are factors which we believe were used and blessed by God to prolong his life.

At the time of this writing (1-25-61) Carl is on the road to recovery and we would use this means to thank all our Christian friends for the many fervent prayers that have been sent up to the Throne of Grace on our behalf. Your concern is deeply appreciated. The bond of Christian fellowship is keenly felt in these very trying times."

After the Board of Directors of Salem Christian School for the Handicapped was elected by the membership, we found that we had no official place to meet. Rev. J. E. Hibma suggested that we meet in his study at the Artesia Reformed Church, 18523 So. Arline Avenue, in Artesia. We have been meeting there ever since on the third Monday of each month plus a few special meetings in between. For the use of Rev. Hibma's study we do sincerely thank the consistory and the congregation of the Artesia Reformed Church.

At our very first meeting organizational business was conducted and a date was set for the opening of our school. Committees were formed for tuition, finance, property and transportation, education, and development and propaganda. Many problems arose in the course of events, but with the help and guidance of our God in heaven, we have been very successful in the operation of Salem thus far.

The articles of incorporation and by-laws for Salem is now in its final stages and we are waiting for official notification from the Secretary of State of California of our incorporation. The franchise tax board has already notified us that we are permitted to receive donations and that these donations will be deductible by the donors in arriving at their taxable net income.

In the near future we hope to have a Salem representative in each of our local churches. Many churches have already appointed these representatives, and for this we thank you. We have not worked closely with them as yet but we will be in touch with them very soon. One of their helpful tasks has been getting this issue of Salem Sidelights to you.

We do thank all of you who have helped Salem thus far. Many tasks and duties have been and are being accomplished by volunteer help. Also, we wish to thank all those who have made donations. We trust that we are assured of your continued support.
